Course Overview

There has been an increased focus on improving education at European level, moving towards a curriculum that believes that all learners have the right to have their individual needs met. A well performing education system supports change through the use of methodologies that allows educators to break own barriers to learning. In response to the increased importance being placed on an understanding of how effective classroom support impacts on pupils' achievements, this intensive course is designed to equip teaching and non-teaching staff with the relevant skills in promoting effective support in the class, which leads



to high quality teaching and develops pupils' independent learning skills.

The course methodology encourages active participation, sharing of good practice and reflection of approaches used to improve the provision and the quality of education. The course is delivered by experienced facilitators, offering a culturally rich learning experiences.

Course Location and Malaga Culture



Málaga is a historic city, offering an authentic representation of the Spanish way of life, particulay the Andalucía region. It boasts a rich architectural heritage, such as the Alcazaba, the Roman Theatre, Jardines de Pedro Luis Alonso, and many others. It is also the birth place of Pablo Picasso. In central Malaga there is a museum dedicated to his private collection of artwork. Málaga is also well know for the production of its sweet wine and some delicious culinary products.

This culturally enriched country is said to be one of the oldest cities in the world, and has a great

panorama of museums, art galleries and festivals. The city has been ruled by a wide array of dynasties such as Roman, Arabic, Phoenician and Christian and has been enhanced by each of them.

Neither Mrs Farrow nor Miss Frost had been to Malaga before.

Mrs Farrow said "I travel to the South of Spain yearly but have never considered going to Malaga. I really didn't have any idea of how beautiful it was! It is absolutely full of rich history, something I'm really interested in. My favourite part of Malaga was the 'unfinished' cathedral in the centre of Malaga town. There was also a castle and a beautiful port where lots of tourists docked. I was also fascinated learning about Picasso. I had no idea he was 92 when he died, with a career spanning over 80 years! His cubism style wasn't due to him 'going crazy' as many people assume, he did, in fact, flit between multiple styles according to external and internal influences."
